## What We Call Home

**W**hat do we call home? I have a hand towel in my bathroom that shamelessly affirms, "Home is where your mom is."

I have been blessed to experience that sentiment first hand, and I like the not-so-subliminal message it sends to my sons!

Depending on our perspective and experience we can generally relate to calling our house, apartment or trailer, "home." College students who live eight months of the year in a dorm, don't usually say they are going home at the end of the day, but they go "home" on fall break. Some people talk about going "home" when they are going to a house they haven't lived in for 40 years. Then there are believers who look forward to the ultimate trip "home" when this life's over.

So many of us are blessed with the love and warmth that often fill "home," and at the least we are blessed to have a secure, stable place to live. Whether our homes are marvelous or modest, most of us have not lived through the stress of being precariously housed in a motel or sleeping on a friend's floor. During the COFM shelter season, our Host sites become "home" for our shelter guests. Some of the men, women and families have stayed with us for a matter of days or weeks; others for months, and sometimes for the entire shelter season.

When we serve our guests, what do we want them to come home to? A safe,

warm place. People who will smile at them, listen to them, and call them by name. A place where they can eat good food, experience fellowship, and go to sleep at night without fear.

It's true, though, that no matter how much we want to create a home-like atmosphere, we operate within the constraints of a temporary shelter, and we can't be naïve to think that we are meeting all needs or that a homeless shelter is ever going to be anyone's first choice to call, "home." But the care that our volunteers and staff bring to the shelter goes a long way to making people feel valued when they are there, and missed when they are not.

I will always remember the charismatic, artistic young man who was one of our guests years ago. No matter how dreary or long the winter day had been, he would burst through the door at check-in time, toss his backpack in a chair, and announce with an infectious smile, "Hey! I'm home!" He was living through an incredibly hard time, and he was the one bringing us joy and energizing us for the work ahead.

Within the year, he died.

Home can be temporary or it can be forever. Those of us serving in COFM know that "temporary" is the reality of what we do in an emergency shelter. But we hope our guests at least feel a fraction of the forever-impact they make on us.

**Can my business or organization sponsor more than one night of shelter?** Absolutely! Any donation of one or more nights will be a blessing to the shelter program.


